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INTRODUCTION

The following is presented as the 2025 Annual Report for the Minooka Fire Protection District. This report summarizes the activities of the Minooka Fire Protection District throughout the 2025 calendar year. The statistical data in the report provides community members with a snapshot of our organization's activities and operations.

ORGANIZATION

HISTORY:

In 1966, following a statutory required election procedure and judicial certification of the election procedure, Minooka Fire Protection District was deemed an organized fire protection district under the statutes of the State of Illinois. The legal organization of the Minooka Fire Protection District followed a long history of fire department operations that dates back to the late 1800s.

Records and documents indicate that the first organized group of people to form a fire brigade was around the 1890's. Local farmers, business owners, and town people constituted the local volunteer fire department. Historical documents and accounts from local people indicate the original fire department was organized following two major fires that destroyed most of the downtown section of Minooka.

In the 1800's, fires were extinguished by bucket brigades, as well as horse and people drawn fire apparatus. In the lobby of the headquarters fire station, you can view one of the original hose carts used by the Minooka Volunteer Fire Department. Today's fire service is much different in terms of fire apparatus and the way we extinguish fires, as well as the expanded services offered by the modern fire protection district.

TODAY:

Minooka Fire Protection District personnel are equipped with some advanced apparatus, equipment, and skills available. Advanced technology in emergency medical service field equipment helps firefighters provide patients with the highest level of care while enroute to the hospital. Rescue and firefighter equipment is advancing regularly as well to provide for improved rescue operations of people trapped in vehicles, as well as technical rescue such as water, below grade, confined space, and high angle.

Minooka Fire Protection District is rated a public protection Class 1 Fire Department by the Insurance Service Office (ISO). Class 1 is the best rating possible.



Response Area:

The Fire District serves a 38-square-mile area, with an estimated population of 16,000. The response area includes heavy industrial, logistics warehousing, commercial, and residential (single and multifamily units). The District includes responses to areas of Interstate 80, the Illinois River, and multiple railroad systems.

The Fire District protects all of the incorporated area of the Village of Minooka, except for one residential subdivision. The Fire District is also responsible for the protection of the Village of Channahon within Grundy County. In 2025, the Village of Shorewood also annexed land within the fire district into the Village limits; therefore, the Minooka Fire Protection District now protects portions of three Villages, within three counties (Grundy, Kendall, and Will).

GOVERNING AUTHORITY

Board of Trustees:

Minooka Fire Protection District is governed by a Board of Trustees under the Fire Protection District Act of Illinois, with board members representing the three counties of the Fire District proportionate to the population in those counties within the Fire District. The following are the 2025 Board of Trustees:

Each trustee is appointed to his/her position by the county board within the county in which they reside and therefore represent. Trustees serve three-year terms. The Board of Trustees is responsible for creating policy for the administration of the Fire District, as well as approving the budget and setting the levy for Fire District operations. The board adopts ordinances and resolutions to provide the fire code and operations of the Fire District.

Fire Commissioners:

In addition to the Board of Trustees, the Fire District has an appointed Board of Fire Commissioners. Commissioners are appointed by the Board of Trustees and must reside within the boundaries of the Fire Protection District. The commissioners are responsible for the establishment of eligibility lists for firefighter hiring, as well as promotional lists for the promotion of fire officers at various ranks. The Board of



Commissioners is responsible for conducting disciplinary hearings and recommendations as necessary by the Illinois Firefighters Disciplinary Act. The following are the 2025 Fire Commissioners:

Firefighter Pension Fund Board of Trustees:

The Firefighters of the Minooka Fire Protection District participate in the Illinois Article 4 Pension, commonly known as the Downstate Firefighters Pension Fund. The pension fund board is a five-member board consisting of two members appointed by the president of the Fire District board, one of whom is a retired firefighter, elected by the retirees that participates in the fund, and two active members of the pension fund are elected by the active pension fund participants.

The pension board is the fiduciary of the pension fund. The Board is responsible for conducting hearings and making decisions related to firefighter pensions, fund actuarial, and disability determinations; all within the authority of the Illinois Article 4 Firefighter Pension Fund Statute.

ADMINISTRATION

The administration of the Fire District includes the fire chief, a deputy chief, an executive assistant, and a part-time clerk. The administration is primarily responsible for the administration of the budget and finance, human resources, planning, and policy development. The fire chief reports directly to the board of trustees. The deputy chief reports to the fire chief.

Budget and Finance:

The Fire District operates under Illinois Statute as a special form of government for fire protection, rescue, and emergency medical services. The Board of Trustees passes an annual budget for the operation of the fire protection district and emergency medical services. The board is also the levy authority for determining the amount of levy necessary to support the operations of the Fire District. Other income to the Fire District beyond taxes includes ambulance user fees, federal Medicare/Medicaid, corporate and federal grants, and various educational program fees.

The Fire District maintains a six-month fund reserve as recommended by the Government Accounting Standards Board (GASB), to provide sufficient funds for operations of the district should revenue not become available or be delayed. Funds are also invested into the capital expenditure account to fund planned future fire station construction, apparatus purchases, and other major expenses.

Accounting practices and financial health of the Fire District are reviewed annually by an independent auditor as required by statute.



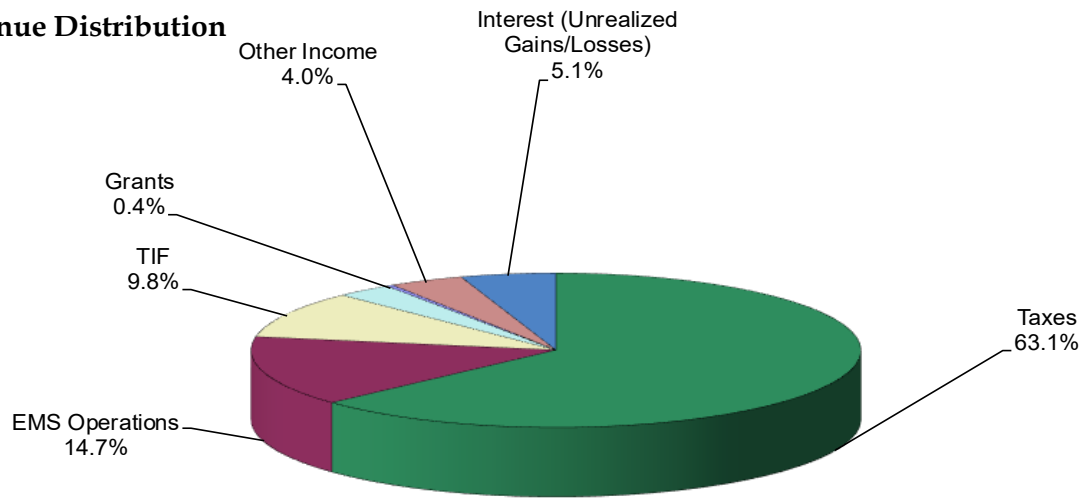

Capital Projects.

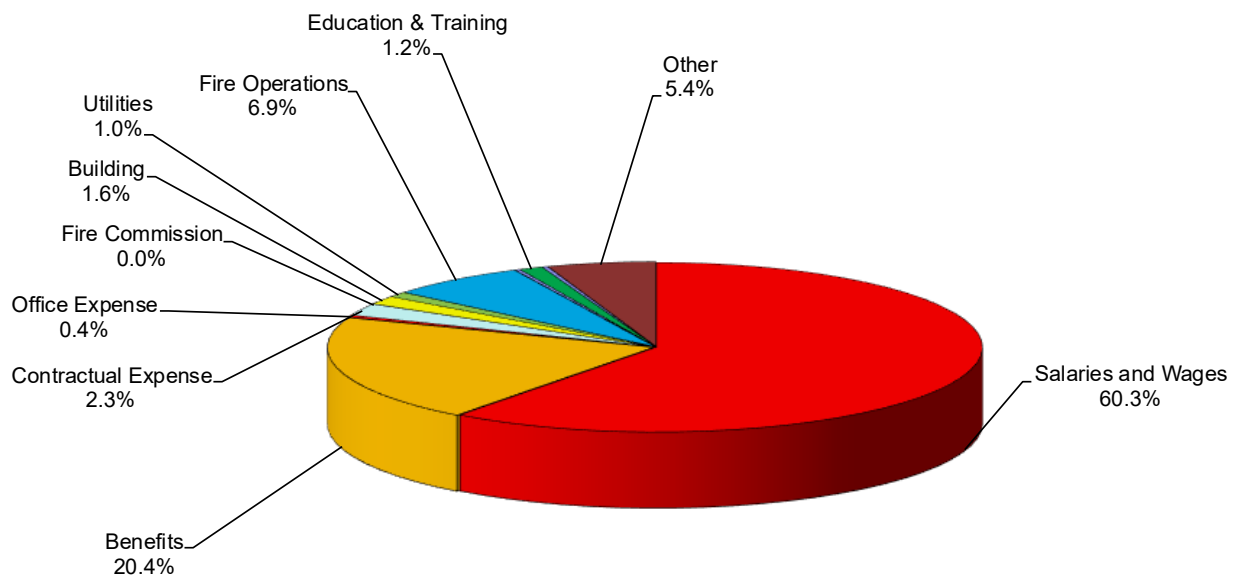
In addition to the operations budget, the budget includes a capital improvement fund to provide funds for debt service on building bonds and capital projects (fire apparatus, buildings, and equipment). The district does not levy any additional tax for the building bonds and makes this payment from general and ambulance funds. FY2025 debt service was \$355,235.00. The Capital improvements budget for FY2025 is \$4,572,000.00. Capital improvements included allocation for major purchases of a fire engine for \$1.1 million, an ambulance for \$360,000.00, and various other portable fire and EMS equipment. \$3 million in the capital improvements budget is allocated to completion of the training center on Twin Rail Drive. Construction progress was delayed, and the majority of the project had to be pushed to FY2026

Pension Funds

In 2022, under the mandate of the State of Illinois, all individual downstate firefighter pension funds, including Minooka Pension Funds, were consolidated into the Illinois Fire Pension Investment Fund (IFPIF). IFPIF was created by statute and consolidated all downstate fire pension funds into one large fund to leverage better returns due to larger funds. Each pension plan's dollars remain dedicated to that fund's needs and cannot be swept to support other less-funded pension plans. The local pension board maintains control over local pension decisions and review of fund disbursements; however, they have no control over the investment process, all of which is handled through investment advisors within the IFPIF group.

Pension Fund accounting practices are reviewed annually by an independent auditor. The pension fund board utilizes a third-party actuary to assess funding requirements and to establish the levy necessary to fund firefighter pensions. Minooka Firefighter Pension Fund is one of the best-funded pension funds within the Downstate Firefighter Pension System, with 100% of the funding requirements currently being met, and has been at the required funded status long before consolidation was mandated.

OPERATIONS:

A significant event occurring in 2024 surrounding operations was an audit by the Insurance Service Office (ISO). ISO evaluates the capability of a community to protect properties against fire. It has been six years since ISO last visited Minooka, when our community became a Public Protection Classification One; the best rating available for a community. Minooka was first audited in September of 2023.

There are many aspects to an ISO evaluation, including fire department operations, community water supply capability (Minooka and Channahon), telecommunications/dispatch, and community risk reduction (inspections & education).

Personnel

Minooka Fire Protection District is comprised of a combination of career, part-time firefighter/paramedics, as well as volunteer recruits and cadets. We also have a combination of full-time career and part-time support/office staff. The Board of Trustees, along with command staff, continues our volunteer and part-time program to offer opportunities to those who are interested in a career in the fire service. The Fire District provides opportunities for volunteer recruits to attend the firefighter academy and become certified firefighters. Part-time firefighters are provided the opportunity for additional EMS training and on-the-job training to be prepared for a career position within the Fire District. Many of these part-time employees come from our volunteer recruit program or are career firefighters in other organizations looking for opportunities near their hometown.



The Fire District offers opportunities for 15 – 17-year-olds through the **cadet firefighter program**. Cadets participate in many of the training opportunities, as do the firefighters who are over 18. This is a great opportunity for kids who are thinking about the fire service. Cadet service allows them to experience the fire service and make an educated decision about their career path.

In late 2025, the fire district administration and the administration of Minooka Community High School (MCHS) finalized plans for a partnership to provide fire science education and cadet experience opportunities to kids at Minooka Community High School. Minooka Fire District has long referred to the cadet program as the “farm team,” where young people can train and develop their firefighting knowledge and skills. Many of the Fire District cadets were enrolled in the area vocational school. MCHS administration decided to bring fire science vocational studies to the MCHS campus. Through this partnership, MCHS Fire Science students are automatically part of the fire district cadet program.

In the fall of 2026, the first MCHS Fire Science students/MCHS Cadets will begin their fire service journey and will conduct their training at the new Minooka Fire District training facility that broke ground on phase 2, the training classroom building, in 2025.

Line personnel are part of the operations of the District. Lieutenants and firefighter/paramedics are the personnel making the daily responses to emergencies. Our daily staffing target is eleven shift personnel on duty; however, with vacation days and sick leave, these numbers can fall to eight. Operations personnel are responsible for the daily readiness of facilities, apparatus, and equipment to be ready to respond whenever called upon.

In addition to the administrative roles, the fire chief and deputy fire chief are considered command staff. Chiefs respond to incidents to provide command and incident management to the emergency, especially those incidents that include a multi-department response or a complex incident. The incident commander is responsible for managing the overall incident so that the proper resources are assigned to effectively control the incident and meet the objectives of the strategies set by the command staff.

In 2025, following a couple of years of planning, Chief Yancey swore in the Minooka Fire Protection District's **first shift battalion chiefs**. This followed a couple of years of planning and discussion with the firefighter union. In 2024, the Board of Trustees finalized the process of selecting and appointing the first battalion chiefs to the organization. On January 13, 2025, Lieutenants Arnold Nolan, Ryan Sievers and Tim Schoeneck were promoted to the rank of battalion chief.

Battalion chiefs are assigned one to each shift and serve as the shift commander and incident commander on many of the incidents in which the Fire District responds. They are responsible for supervising and managing the operations of both stations, working together with lieutenants who are assigned to each station.





Lieutenants lead their company of firefighters at their assigned stations. Each station has a lieutenant assigned. The lieutenant is the immediate supervisor of the firefighter/paramedics assigned to the station. Lieutenants are responsible for making sure the apparatus and equipment at their assigned station are in a ready state and then guiding the response of responding apparatus and directing the deployment of personnel and equipment when arriving at the scene of an incident. Lieutenants work with the battalion chief to provide for overall coordination and efficiency in daily operations.

Our **firefighter/paramedics** are the personnel working at the tactical level of each incident; operating the apparatus, handling the hose, rescue tools, and delivering medical care at the scene of incidents and in the ambulance. Our firefighter/paramedics are trained in many levels of medical care, fire suppression and rescue. All of our firefighters are State of Illinois-certified firefighters, and the majority of shift personnel are paramedics, some at the EMT-B level. In addition to responding to emergency calls, the personnel on duty participate in training exercises, safety inspections of businesses, cleaning, and inspection, as well as minor maintenance on stations, apparatus, and equipment, and physical fitness.

Many of our firefighters also have advanced rescue certifications in specialized rescue to participate in one or more of the specialized teams of the Fire District. Minooka Fire District is a member of the following regional teams:



- MABAS 15 Water Rescue (surface, ice, swift, and underwater)
- MABAS 15 Technical rescue (confined space, trench, collapse, and high angle)
- MABAS 15 Hazardous Materials
- MABAS 15 Incident Management
- MABAS 15 Fire Investigations

EMS OPERATIONS

EMS operations are a large part of what the Fire District does. More than 65% of our responses are medical or rescue-driven activities. Our EMS Operations falls within the Operations Division of the Fire District. The Fire District Emergency Medical Services Coordinator is responsible for the coordination of EMS between the EMS system, the hospital and the Fire District. Our coordinator is responsible for coordinating training, equipment, orientation, implementation of new standard medical orders, and overall general EMS operations.

The Fire District EMS operations are directed through Morris Hospital Emergency Medical Services System. Our paramedics operate under the guidance and direction of a Medical Doctor at Morris Hospital. Paramedics use standing medical orders (SMO) established by a Regional EMS System designated by the Illinois Department of Public Health (IDPH) to deliver medical services daily. While in the field, our paramedics are able to contact the emergency department physicians for additional guidance, as needed. Beyond the initial licensing of paramedics, Minooka Fire District Paramedics also receive specialty certifications in Advanced Cardiac Life Support (ACLS) and Pediatric Trauma Life Support (PTLS), and several other levels.

Minooka ambulances are equipped with state-of-the-art life support equipment, including cardiac monitors connected to local hospital emergency departments, where doctors can immediately read patient conditions and prepare the emergency room to begin treatment of the patient once the ambulance arrives. We also carry automatic cardiopulmonary resuscitation devices that are automated to perform CPR while paramedics work at providing additional medical care for a patient who is in cardiac arrest.

The Fire District works with other neighboring fire departments and police departments for Rescue Task Force (RTF) operations. Our organization has participated in past year drills to evaluate the ability of local fire, EMS, and police in a response to a mass casualty/active shooter event.



TRAINING

Our training division is led by a training coordinator who is responsible for planning and scheduling training as well as providing instruction for some programs. Minooka Firefighters conduct training when on shift. Our recruits and cadets conduct their training on Wednesday nights.

Overview

Personnel averaged **503.51 training hours per member**, with **45 total members** participating.

Training Facility Utilization

A total of 1,553.5 hours of cumulative hours of training were conducted at our new training tower facility on Twin Rail Drive in Minooka. This accounted for an average of 1.84 hours per session, reflecting more in-depth, hands-on training evolutions.

Certifications & Specialized Instruction

- **OSFM Recertifications:** 104 completed by 24 members
 - *Certified personnel are required to recertify in timeframes specified by the Office of the Illinois State Fire Marshal.*
- **Outside Instructors:** 6 utilized
 - *The fire district often uses outside instructors to deliver specialized classes.*

FACILITIES

The administration of the Fire Protection District is operated from Fire District Headquarters – Station 1, located at 7901 E. Minooka Rd. The headquarters serves as the home to our administrative offices of the fire chief, deputy chief, and administrative staff, fire prevention & education and training programs, and the EMS coordinator. The station also provides residential facilities for firefighter/paramedics working 24-hour shifts. Station #1 includes our training classrooms that can seat up to 60 people.



MINOOKA FIRE STATION #1- HEADQUARTERS

Station #2 is located at 28643 W. Eames St., Channahon. This station is located on Rt. 6 near the industrial plants, west of Channahon. Station #2 serves as a response facility for the southern areas of the Fire District, including the U.S. Route 6 industrial corridor. Station #2 is equipped with an ambulance and engine. The facility houses no administrative or support offices and serves as a response station only.

Administration continues to assess and monitor development in the north side of the Fire District, where an additional station is planned. The future fire station location is in the area of Wildy and Ridge Rd.

All stations are supplied with emergency back-up power to operate in the event of a power failure. Both stations have residence facilities (bunkrooms, kitchen, and locker room) for the staff working 24/7 from the station. Each station also has an exercise facility for firefighters to maintain their cardiovascular and muscle strength. All stations are secured for the safety of the staff as well as the readiness of the Fire District to respond.

In 2023, the Board of Trustees authorized a concept study for a new fire and EMS training facility that will be located at 1001 Twin Rail Drive, Minooka. The Fire District hired a construction manager to manage the project. Phase one of the project, including site work and utilities, was completed in 2024. In 2025, the



training tower, which is a modular unit, was finished and opened. In 2026, the second phase of the project, a training classroom building with an apparatus bay space, will be completed. This facility will be the home to the Minooka High School/Minooka Fire District partnership for fire science education.



SUPPORT SERVICES – FLEET

The fire and rescue operation of the Fire District is accomplished using multiple types of vehicles. Our fleet of vehicles includes ambulances, fire engines, ladder trucks, heavy rescue, water tenders, specialized rescue vehicles, and staff cars.

All of our fleet is maintained by fire apparatus mechanics known as an “Emergency Vehicle Technician (EVT). Minooka Fire District, Morris Fire District, and Troy Fire District share a maintenance facility located in Morris and share the cost of two EVTs.

In late 2025, the Board of Trustees approved the order of a new aerial apparatus for \$2.4 million. This apparatus is expected to be delivered in 2030.

COMMUNITY RISK REDUCTION

The fire district's Community Risk Reduction (CRR) Bureau includes inspection services and public education. Minooka Fire District is one of only a few fire districts in the region to have a full-time fire and life safety educator who is working regularly with schools, community groups, and individuals to deliver high-quality public education. Our inspection services work closely with the building departments in the Village of Channahon and the Village of Minooka for compliance with the fire and life safety codes.

Within the incorporated limit of the Village of Channahon and the Village of Minooka, the Village is the authority having jurisdiction for the fire code. In the unincorporated area of the fire district, the fire district is the authority having jurisdiction for the fire code.

Inspection Services:

The Fire District employs one fire inspector who is responsible for routine inspection of businesses and commercial facilities, as well as fire alarm and sprinkler plan review and approval. The inspector conducts fire and life safety inspections on commercial and industrial facilities within the incorporated and unincorporated areas of the Fire District and provides courtesy home fire safety surveys.

The inspector is responsible for overseeing our compliance software and following up on the annual commercial cooking hood/duct extinguishing system. The inspector is responsible for final inspections of



newly installed fire alarms and sprinkler systems, and for occupancy inspections in conjunction with the village or county building officer to ensure the facility complies with fire code.

In addition to the fire inspector, on-duty crews also conduct inspections of businesses. This process allows our crews the opportunity to see the business operations and have familiarity with the layout of buildings and types of operations, in the event of an emergency.

Compliance Engine statistics are related to our compliance software that audits local business compliance to annual service and inspections of fire alarms, sprinkler systems, and restaurant extinguishing hoods. Minooka Fire Protection District maintains 95% compliance on inspection of these devices.





Fire & Life Safety Education:

Since 2002, the Minooka Fire Protection District and Channahon Fire Protection District have shared a full-time Fire and Life Safety Educator (F&LSE). Due to a growing population, an increased number of businesses, and growing schools, in 2025, the F&LSE position was restructured, with each fire district maintaining its own F&LSE. Minooka Fire District appreciates the cooperation and partnership with Channahon Fire District for more than twenty years.

The F&LSE delivers all types of educational programs to the community, including CPR, first aid, car seat installation, senior citizen safety, fall prevention, as well as safety bulletins through social media and websites.

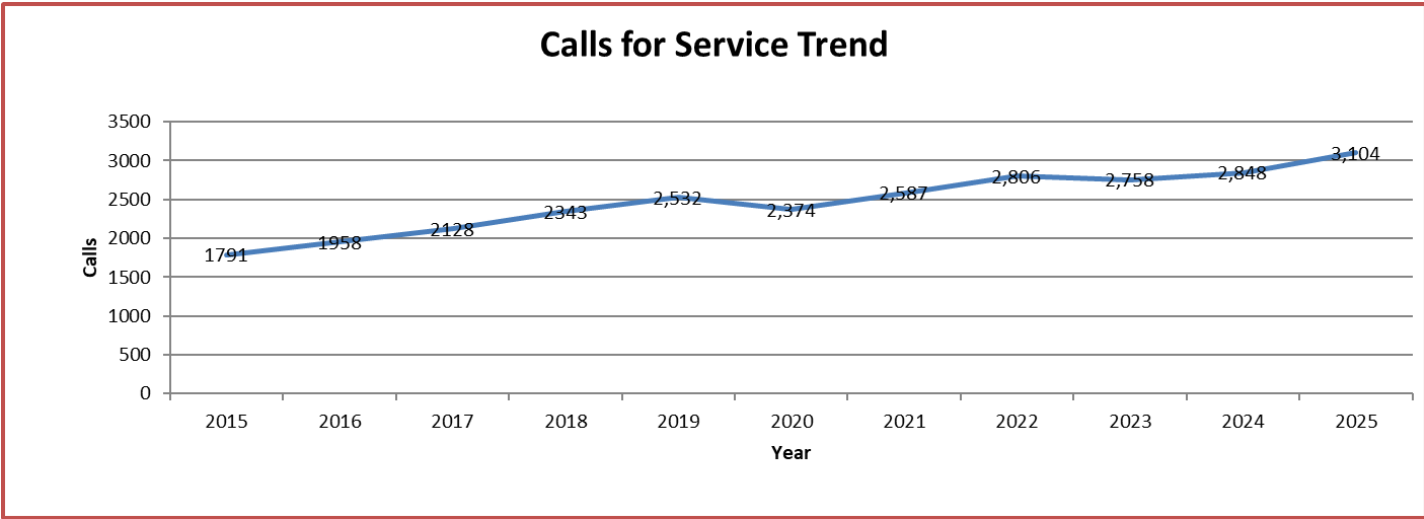

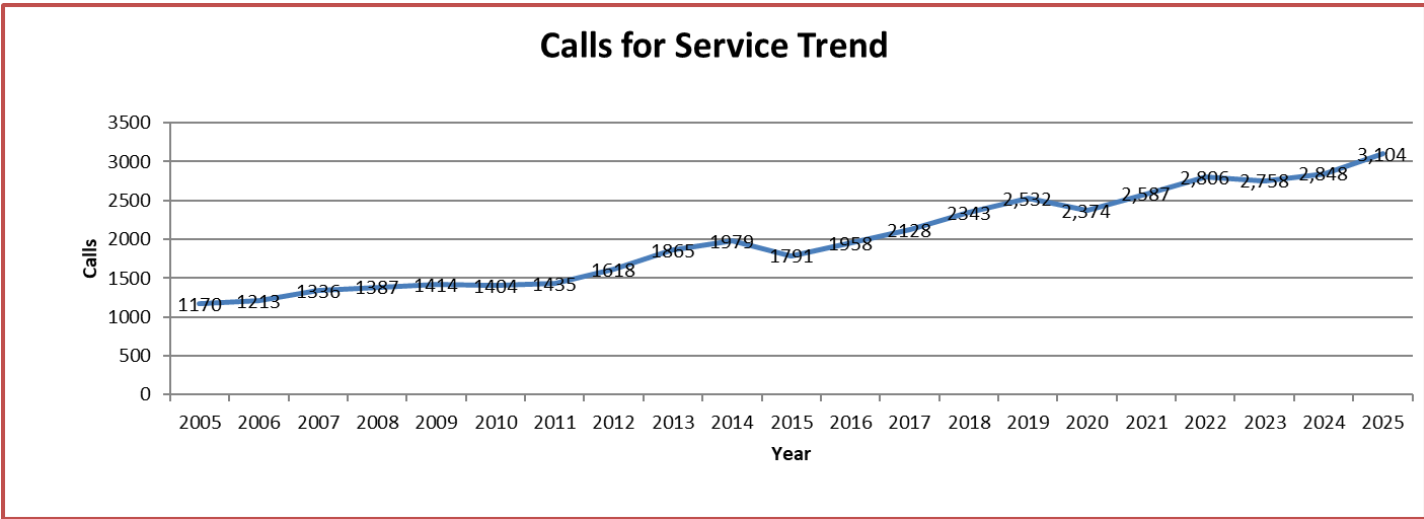
RESPONSE STATISTICS

Minooka Fire Protection District responded to 3,104 calls for service in 2025. This represents a 9% increase in calls for service over 2024. The organization has experienced a 73% increase in calls for service over the past ten years.
